FACILITATORS

Bridget Blount

Bridget Blount is the Chief Impact Officer with Baltimore's Promise where she directs data analysis, evaluation, and the Baltimore Youth Data Hub. The Hub brings communities, providers, policymakers, and researchers into partnership to make informed decisions as they work to eliminate disparities and achieve equitable outcomes for Baltimore's youth and families. Before joining Baltimore's Promise in 2018, Bridget served as the Director of Data and Evaluation for the Family League of Baltimore City, where she led the development of two citywide management information systems to collect data from diverse summer program providers and prenatal home visiting programs. Bridget is passionate about helping nonprofits harness the power of data to strengthen their organizations, improve their services, and communicate their impact.

Jarvis Brunson

Jarvis Brunson is a 36-year-old community activist from Fort Lauderdale, Florida. Raised in the area, Jarvis has dedicated over two decades to advocating for underserved communities. He founded a nonprofit focused on youth development and education, aiming to elevate opportunities for children through promoting academic success and personal growth. Jarvis serves on the Children's Services Board, the Advisory Board of the Broward County Board of County Commission, and the House of Love Ministries Board of Directors in Lauderhill, FL. His efforts also focus on helping individuals and families understand and navigate various support systems, emphasizing the importance of having a voice in decision-making processes that impact their lives.

Devin Corrigan

Devin Corrigan is the Supervisor of Analytics at the San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD). He joined SFUSD in 2016 to support shared research and analysis needs among SFUSD, the San Francisco Human Services Agency, and the San Francisco Department of Children, Youth and Their Families, with a particular focus on integrated data systems and data governance. Devin has overseen dozens of large-scale quantitative and qualitative data collection efforts among San Francisco students. families, and educators. He manages the external research processes at SFUSD related to data sharing agreements and the fulfillment of data requests. Internally at SFUSD, he also designs/ leads trainings related to FERPA and the ethics of data sharing. Devin holds degrees from Stanford University (MA) and Georgetown University (BA).

Carl Dasse

Dr. Carl Dasse has worked for the Children's Services Council of Broward County (CSC) for fourteen years, where he serves as the Director of Community Research and Partnering. He coordinates backbone support for the Broward Children's Strategic Plan's 35+ committees consisting of community organizations implementing a Result Based Accountability framework to improve the overall conditions of children and families in Broward County. He also provides the leadership and direction for CSC's Community Participatory Action Research (CPAR) and Asset Based Community Development initiatives. Dr. Dasse's passion for advancing positive narratives about people with lived experience has been at the center of his co-creation of the Broward Data Collaborative IDS and its intentional focus on equity for people whose data populates the system.

Sue Gallagher, EdD, is the Chief Innovation Officer at the Children's Services Council of Broward County, FL. She brings over 30 years of local government and non-profit experience to her role as an AISP Equity Fellow. With local partners and colleagues, Sue co-created the Broward Data Collaborative in 2017. The Collaborative's innovative approach to data sharing has included a focus on community participatory action research, youth priorities, and assetbased development. Sue is excited about the opportunity to help expand deep, structural, equitable community participation in data infrastructure and use.

Bob Gradeck

Robert Gradeck has 25 years of professional experience helping people find and use civic information. He manages and co-founded the Western Pennsylvania Regional Data Center (WPRDC) at the University of Pittsburgh. The WPRDC is an inclusive open data partnership between the University, Allegheny County, and the City of Pittsburgh. The WPRDC helps to inform many community initiatives in the areas of health, housing, environmental protection, transportation, and social justice. He is a member of the Civic Switchboard project, which helps libraries and library workers become participants in civic data initiatives, and participates in the National Neighborhood Indicators Partnership. Robert is also currently a co-leader of the Black Equity Coalition's Data Justice Working Group. He received his B.A. in Urban Studies from the University of Pittsburgh, and Masters in City Planning from the Georgia Institute of Technology.

Briellen Griffin

Briellen Griffin works on a variety of research and evaluation studies that focus on education and community well-being. Her primary research interests are centered around race equity in education policy and practice, across the lifespan. She is also interested in projects that assess social service networks, systemic inequality, and processes of social change. Before coming to Wilder, Briellen worked as an instructor and researcher in higher education, with a focus on education and social policy. She holds a PhD in cultural and educational policy studies from Loyola University Chicago School of Education. Briellen was also a school social worker in North Minneapolis and holds an MSW from the University of Minnesota, as well as a BA in English.

Sydney Idzikowski

Sydney Idzikowski is the Associate Director at the Charlotte Regional Data Trust where she works with people and data to create a shared data infrastructure that can be used to answer complex questions and find collaborative solutions. Sydney has her Bachelor's degree in Social Work from Warren Wilson College and her Master's in Social Work from UNC Chapel Hill. She finds joy in our natural and wild spaces (bird watching of particular interest!), working on the small and big ways to address the climate crisis in front of us, and all things homemade.

Blu Lewis

Blu Lewis—originally from Harlem, NY—is passionate about honoring Black Radical Traditions and building infrastructure that can shift the conditions for Black people and movements. They have over ten years of experience as a community organizer, researcher, program director, and creator of popular education curriculum. In their current work, Blu focuses on coordinating, aligning, and developing Black & POC membership-led movements centered on meeting the needs and shifting the conditions of Black communities and dismantling data capitalism. Blu resides in Charlotte, NC and is a Community Participatory Researcher for the Our Data Bodies research collective, Organizing Director of NC BLOC, and Minister of Organizing for the Movement for Black Lives.

And our data systems, culture, and context must honor that complexity. Kim has worked for over a decade in public service as a government analytics leader. She is now the Director of the Health Equity Clinical Program for Blue Cross Blue Shield of Rhode Island. She lives in Rhode Island with her wife and twin girls.

Tawana Petty

Tawana Petty is a mother, social justice organizer, poet, author, and facilitator. Her work focuses on racial justice, equity, privacy, and consent. Enid Rey

Enid M. Rey, Esq. has twenty years of innovative, visionary leadership and achievement in the philanthropic, legal, government and nonprofit sectors. She is a nationally recognized advocate and speaker in the fields of family support, positive youth development, and school integration efforts. As a skilled advocate for children, youth and families, Enid's success is in bridging policy, protocols, process, and quality practice to affect change in the outcomes for youth and families. Fluent in Spanish and English, with extensive public speaking and mediarelations experience, her work in education was featured in the 2015 This American Life episode on school integration, "The Problem We All Live With." Throughout her career she has developed a unique vantage point that enables her to connect

systems change work and grass roots community capacity building efforts. Her work is centered on the values and belief that youth and families are resident experts in their conditions and have the knowledge and capacity needed to build transformative action for their own communities.

James Sadler

James Sadler is the Director of Research and Analytics at Baltimore's Promise, where he oversees the day-to-day data management and analysis tasks across the many initiatives of the organization. Through his role, James also oversees the research agenda of Baltimore's Promise, which includes collaborating with institutions across the state of Maryland including the Maryland Longitudinal Data System (MLDS) and the Baltimore City Youth Data Hub (BCYDH). James holds a PhD in Education Policy from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and a Master of Science in Education from the University of Pennsylvania that he earned while teaching in a Philadelphia high school. Now living and working in Baltimore, James is committed to using his skills to help empower local communities in the city to improve outcomes for youth from cradle to career.

Lori Thomas

Dr. M. Lori Thomas is the Executive Director of the UNC Charlotte Urban Institute and the Charlotte Regional Data Trust, a nonprofit integrated community data system located in the Urban Institute. She is an Associate Professor of Social Work and her scholarship includes programmatic and systemic responses to homelessness and housing instability across the lifespan, particularly among older adults and those with health and mental health disorders. Her research and community engagement are informed by over 15 years of practice experience in affordable housing, community development, and homelessness. She recently led the evaluation of Housing First Charlotte-Mecklenburg, Charlotte's effort to end chronic homelessness and is extensively engaged in community efforts to address homelessness in Charlotte.

Dennis Culhane

Dennis Culhane, PhD, is the Dana and Andrew Stone Professor of Social Policy at the School of Social Policy and Practice at the University of Pennsylvania and Co-founder and Faculty Director of AISP. He also served as the Director of Research for the National Center on Homelessness among Veterans at the United States Department of Veterans Affairs from 2009 - 2018. Culhane is a nationally recognized social science researcher with primary expertise in the field of homelessness. His homelessness work positioned him as an early innovator in the use of administrative data for research and policy analysis, particularly for populations and program impacts which are difficult to assess and track. Culhane's work has resulted in federal legislation requiring all cities and states to develop administrative data systems for tracking homeless services in order to receive HUD funding. His recent research includes studies of vulnerable youth and young adults, including those transitioning from foster care, juvenile justice, and residential treatment services.

Della Jenkins

Della Jenkins, MS, is the Executive Director of AISP. In this role, she oversees the initiative's daily operations and strategic partnerships and works to promote the development and use of integrated data systems across the country. Under her leadership, the team has doubled in size and grown to support over 40 state and local data sharing efforts nationally. Prior to joining AISP in 2017, Della's professional experience included child advocacy, policy analysis, and mixed-methods research and program evaluation spanning the birth to post-secondary education spectrum. She earned her BA in Political Science from Georgetown University and her MS in Social Policy from the University of Pennsylvania. She lives in Southern Vermont with her talented husband, energetic toddler, and two sweet cats.

Amy Hawn Nelson

Amy Hawn Nelson, PhD, is Research Faculty at the University of Pennsylvania and the Director of Training and Technical Assistance for AISP.
