Legal Tactics for Preserving Privacy + Promoting Equity

Amelia Vance will share insights from her experience serving as a witness, offering a behind-the-scenes look at what makes testimony impactful in state and federal legislative hearings. The session will culminate in a hands-on exercise, where participants will review and respond to a sample public comment, applying key concepts in real time.
